Te Ara Tupua partners

- Ngā Ūranga ki Pito-One (Ngauranga to Petone) and Pito-One to Melling (Petone to Melling) sections are being planned and delivered by Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency.
- Working in partnership with mana whenua
 - Taranaki Whānui ki te Upoko o te Ika
 - Ngāti Toa Rangatira
- And local government partners
 - Hutt City Council (funding partner for P2M, key roles with N2P)
 - Wellington City Council and Greater Wellington Regional Council (funding partners for N2P)
- KiwiRail closely involved given work near rail corridor

The big picture

Critical missing link needed to provide a safe and attractive walking and cycling route between Wellington and Lower Hutt.

Regional context:

- Let's Get Wellington Moving projects
- RiverLink and Melling Transport Improvements
- Hutt City Council and Wellington City Council projects
- Existing networks e.g. Pito-One foreshore paths, Hutt River Trail



COVID-19 Recovery (Fast-track Consenting) Act

- A new fast-track resource consenting and designation processes, aimed at promoting economic recovery by bringing forward projects.
- Te Ara Tupua (Nga Ūranga ki Pito-one) is a listed project.
- Provides a shortened timeframe for consents to be decided by specially convened expert panels including a qualified member nominated by iwi mana whenua.
- Local authorities have been invited to comment during the process.
- Waka Kotahi remain committed to working with mana whenua, local government partners and the community - and to delivering projects with good environmental, social and cultural outcomes.

Application was lodged with EPA in October 2020



Objectives and outcomes


- To provide safe walking and cycling infrastructure connecting Ngā Ūranga and Pito-One, that is a catalyst for increased walking and cycling between Wellington and the Hutt Valley
- In providing a walking and cycling connection, enhance the resilience of the transport corridor between Ngā Ūranga and Pito-One.

Supporting Economic Recovery

- Approximately 330 jobs supported by project construction (directly employed or employed in supply chain)
- Another approximately 125 jobs created by consumer spending in the wider economy.

Whānau – friendships, relationships, shared responsibilities to Te Whanganui a Tara are developed.


Mana Whenua - Give life to the responsibilities mana whenua have to Te Whanganui a Tara.

Ahua – the natural beauty created by **Papatūānuku** – We seek to re-foster




Two main types of coastal edge

Shared path with revetment



Shared path with seawall – protecting high-value beach habitat



- One of the key design changes since 2019 is to preserve gravel beach habitats.
- Incorporating a seawall edge reduces footprint over these areas.
- Seawalls topped with 1.2m
 screens (except Karanga Point –
 1.8m screen)
- Revetment and seawalls futureproofed for adaptation to sealevel rise designed in line with MfE guidelines.
