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VISION CBD 2030 INTRODUCTION

This document presents a vision for the central business district (CBD) of Hutt City -Vision CBD 2030 - for community consideration and comment. The ideas and views proposed in the document came from Council engaging with the community during August-September 2008.

While the CBD is the primary concern of this document, Hutt City Council (Council) understands that changes in the CBD will affect the rest of Hutt City.

It is vitally important that the CBD connects with and complements all the communities within Hutt City – this will be taken into account when implementing actions. Vision CBD 2030 will serve as a guiding document focused on building a cohesive Hutt City, while reflecting the unique features of the CBD. Please see Appendix 1 for a definition of the CBD.



WHAT IS VISION CBD 2030?

This vision

- Represents a shared future vision for the CBD of Hutt City out to the year 2030
- · Captures the ideas and passions of the Hutt City community
- Paints a picture of a shared future that takes into consideration what people care about most.

THE SIX THEMES

Vision CBD 2030 sets out what the Council and the community want for Hutt City's CBD in the long term.



There are six broad themes, which focus on a CBD that has these qualities:

LIVEABLE
UNIQUE
SUSTAINABLE
GROWTH
CONNECTED
QUALITY

These six themes align with the nine community outcomes identified in the Hutt City Council Long-Term Council Community Plan (LTCCP) 2006–2017. Please refer to Appendix 2 for more detail.

Ultimately, Vision CBD 2030 will guide Council's decision-making in the longer term. The decisions made will, in turn, guide Council as it undertakes the many different actions required to turn the vision into a reality and help us develop a more cohesive and stronger CBD. Changes will include giving greater recognition to and preserving what we, as a community, value. Vision CBD 2030 provides a guide for potential growth and, more importantly, the kind of growth our community says it wants.

Institutions and organisations with an interest in the future of our CBD will be able to use Vision CBD 2030 as a framework to guide their decisions. Working in partnerships will be essential to achieve our vision. Council cannot deliver a vibrant and growing CBD alone – Vision CBD 2030 recognises this.

Council is working on a programme of vision statements for Petone (2007), the CBD (this document) and Seaview Gracefield (to be undertaken in 2009). It is important that these three documents provide a comprehensive and cohesive view of these parts of Hutt City into the future. This has been taken into account in developing Vision CBD 2030.

- Public consultation of Draft Vision CBD 2030 closed on 12 December 2008
- This document is the final version of Vision CBD 2030
- Consider what District Plan changes will be required to "make the Vision happen"
- Develop an overall CBD plan to implement our vision in conjunction with the community and urban design experts
- Programme capital works into future funding requirements
- Continue to have discussions with the community to implement initiatives in 2009 and beyond.





OVERALL VISION FOR 2030


Shaped by the Hutt River, the Hutt CBD connects people and nature to create a lively and vibrant place.

In 2030:


We are a **people-friendly** CBD. There is a sense of a local community feeling with people "bumping shoulders" and chatting on the streets. We feel proud of our well preserved and respected natural surroundings especially our river. Our CBD offers a great opportunity to live the lifestyle of choice while still being able to work in a sophisticated and modern environment.

Cultural diversity is celebrated. Local communities participate in cultural activities, giving recognition to our rich and diverse cultural heritage.

Our CBD offers exceptional **quality of life.** With the river and walkways just minutes away from commercial offices, life is an exciting balance of nature, work and entertainment. Pedestrian- and cycle-friendly lanes along gardens and urban parks make walking and cycling enjoyable. The city attracts native birds and other creatures. Residents often arrange to meet and work at community gardens during weekends and lunch hours. Trees and gardens convert streets and alleyways into enjoyable and productive community spaces. In 2030:

Our city has a vibrant and thriving heart – a central space or piazza where people congregate, sit, work and have an inspiring and enjoyable time.

Our CBD is a **central point** for businesses and communities. Our heart is an attractive centre that complements our surrounding neighbourhoods, drawing together the distinctive qualities of each, to ensure that Hutt City becomes a unique destination of choice.


When entering the CBD, we see characteristic art and **cultural presence** that represents the uniqueness of our city. We provide for artistic expressions throughout the CBD. Māori, Pasifika, contemporary and other cultural artwork reflect the people of the place.

Creative energy is felt everywhere – from people discussing ideas in cafés, to murals, sculptures and community gardens. Artists live and work in the CBD in galleries and workshops. During the weekends, the CBD is buzzing with different types

of markets. Cultural performances are valued, with our communities enjoying performances throughout the year. We are also known for hosting unique festivals, events and conferences. Our 1950s style annual festival attracts both local residents and visitors from afar.

Our heart connects to our river. The **River Heritage** Trail, rich with stories and history, is a major attraction to local residents and visitors. With the protection of habitats and native flora, the river corridor has become the pride and joy of Hutt citizens. In addition, people enjoy strolling along the river promenade with its cafés and restaurants.





As a sustainable CBD, our citizens and decisionmakers **proactively** address key issues including transportation, development, energy and water use. Protection and restoration of our natural environment is integrated into every aspect of civic life, guiding our decisions and public policy.

All our citizens have **affordable access** to public resources such as public transportation, bike and pedestrian paths, community gardens and locally



A CBD that is "compact with choices".

In 2030:

Sustainable modes of transport are the preferred options for a large proportion of our citizens. Our streets are designed to provide safety to people who choose active modes. Public transport (PT), trains and buses, provide efficient services to people of all ages and abilities into and around the CBD. Connections to and from PT stations are sheltered from the weather. People can also make use of service lanes and arcades as effective connectors to move through the CBD.

We love our "10 minutes' walk anywhere" CBD design. Pleasant walking and cycling lanes connect key places within the CBD and beyond. People can move around healthily and cheaply. Routes are clearly signposted and memorable, with the popular routes being the Inner City Walk, River Promenade Stroll, and Garden and Arts Meander. Our connections extend to the surrounding **neighbourhoods**. People in the residential and industrial areas around the CBD can choose how they want to get to the CBD. The walking and cycling lanes provide a fun and easy way to stay connected.


We are also an **online** city, with advanced digital networks that support our residents and business sectors. People have the opportunity to work where they choose to live. In 2030:

We take pride in our **balanced approach** to economic and population growth, taking into consideration the total wellbeing of our people, communities, businesses and the environment.

Our CBD is a **"valley of local businesses**". As a successful commercial centre, we foster the development of small and large businesses that support our local economy and enhance our pool of local talent. There are mentorship and support programmes available to help small businesses grow and thrive.

Some communities have pooled their resources to set up enterprises supplying locally produced products and services. Locally owned businesses are growing due to the increasing demand from people wanting to buy local products and services.

We are proud of our science and art sectors. Our CBD, like other areas of the city, contributes successfully towards research and development in the fields of medicine, biotech, natural health and beauty, marine, information technology, earthquake engineering and environmentally related technologies. We continue to attract and cultivate successful **partnerships** in growth areas that are complementary. Partnerships add to the creative and entrepreneurial workforce that sustains and renews our economy.

We have managed to accommodate economic and population growth through redeveloping sites in the CBD. In addition to protecting our green and open spaces within the CBD, **commitment to good planning** for growth has ensured that natural areas and outdoor recreation are easily accessible to everyone. Buildings and areas that are unique in terms of features, character and views are kept to complement the new developments.

Changes in **demographics** add to the economic vitality of our CBD. With diverse international cultures, local communities are benefiting from the rich assortment of musical, arts and cultural talents. The over 50s are a growing sector, contributing towards the pool of skills and experience available in the CBD.



In 2030:

Our CBD built environment is a mix of retrofitted old and modern.

Our CBD provides for


- · people from "cradle to grave" and of all abilities
- quality buildings and spaces that are environmentally sustainable
- · nature to thrive alongside our built environment
- a sense of openness with views and character
- · meeting the needs of residents and businesses
- creative spaces that foster ideas and human relationships.

Our built environment caters for the **needs of people,** from children to the elderly, by making it easy for them to go to places and to enjoy the attractions in the CBD.

New development meets or exceeds **sustainable building standards**, while many existing buildings have been renovated for efficiency. Our CBD promotes concentrated development close to public transportation. Our quality environment accommodates increase in population while incorporating pocket parks and **environmentally protected areas**, including our river, street trees, community gardens and green spaces. Everyone in the CBD can spend time in nature for relaxation.

Distinctive character buildings and streets are retained alongside new development. Our CBD is carefully planned to provide a **sense of openness** and to ensure that views of our beautiful surroundings remain available to areas within and around the CBD. Taller buildings that meet the needs of large businesses are located at the commercial centre of the CBD. Medium-low dwellings for small businesses and local residents are found in other parts of the CBD.

People meet and discuss ideas and innovation in formal and informal spaces. There are places that stimulate conversations or support quiet enjoyment including sidewalks, cafés, street corners, lanes and "chill out" creative spaces.


