The Wall Walk programme offered an opportunity to deepen understanding of New Zealand's history, including colonisation, and its ongoing effects. By engaging in this kaupapa, our team gained a richer perspective on the social, political, and historical factors that shape our society.

Learning about the history of Aotearoa in this way equips us to address inequities, foster stronger relationships with hāpori Māori communities, and ensure our services are more reflective of the needs of all New Zealanders.

The Wall Walk programme improves our cultural understanding, workplace practices, and overall engagement with principles of Te Tiriti. The Wall Walk included interactive learning that engage our team, making the learning process more engaging and memorable.

It promotes a greater awareness and appreciation of Māori culture and perspectives, fostering cultural sensitivity and respect. The historical context provided detailed insights into the historical events leading up to the signing of the Treaty, as well as its impact on Māori over time.

Although Hutt City Council has an obligation to take into account the principles of Te Tiriti o Waitangi
